




Fwd: Groene email exchange

I was a consulting actuary who dealt with many of the largest companies in the country with one of their largest expenditures their employee benefit programs. In that role I had to deal in facts not opinions, otherwise I could cause huge losses to my client. I did not sit in a cubical studying the past, instead I presented complex facts to senior executives or boards that involved hundreds of millions of dollars and believe me opinion and prejudice were not allowed only strongly supportable facts. My billing rate was \$325 per hour and that was 15 years ago. Don't try to feed me crap about the free market; I made my living in it for 40 years ago.

You are correct – the parents of these children that I am concerned with also came out of the same environment that these children are in today. That is true going back many generations. As I said earlier, education is not the universal equalizer for children of color, immigrant children and Native American children. Instead it is a vicious circle for most of these children. You accuse the teacher with absolutely no facts to support your position and with tons of evidence and research that says that variation in teacher quality accounts for less that 10% of the variation in educational achievement between rich and poor children. Yet you persist in your unsupported assault on teachers.

My concern is to break that cycle. I know it can be done and I am sure that the tiny investment today will pay huge returns later on in fewer welfare claims and fewer prison cells. We are beginning to see the public move in this direction and I firmly believe that trend will continue.

But in response to your political rant:

-- UNICEF is not lying about CHILD POVERTY in the United States. Rest
assured if they were our UN representatives would be throwing fits with them. Try
reading a book or newspaper and you will see that 1 in 5 (almost 1 in 4) of our children
are living in poverty. And you don't care. What a horrible public official!

- Secondly I was a police officer in Lincoln during much of the Vietnam War, and have been paralyzed by fear in that role. The way you throw around the term coward it is clear you have never been in life and death situations and apparently are greatly ashamed of it.
- - Schools use to be run by local elected school boards for as long as we have had public schools. But the Bush II No Child Left Behind has turned that local control over to Washington.
- — Lastly, if you ever took economics you would understand micro and macro-economics. At the micro level we see individual transactions and motivations (comparable to the teacher teaching to 15 individual students) while at the macro level we see the collective response to stimulus (comparable to the fact that the major driver of educational performance is poverty.) It is the macro that you seem to see as "treat human children as livestock and lump them together as a group study." You must have partied a lot in college?

I have dealt with senior business executives and policymakers at all levels most of my life, but your rants are the most ignorant that I have ever been involved in. Please don't waste my time with any more of your hate and inadequacy.

No where have I even hinted that teachers should be excused from teaching because the school they work in is high poverty, high immigrant or high Native American. Teachers see individual students and they teach those individual children as best they can. But education leaders and policymakers must understand the facts and build policy based upon those facts. Those facts confirm that educational performance is driven by poverty not by teacher "laz[iness] or second rate" ability. Your suggestion that teachers "who justified their lack of ability to teach and told me as a youth that I had an excuse to fail because of my families poverty" is your strawman not anything that I have suggested.

You say that you "do not judge children's success by their race or economic status" - no matter what the evidence and research says? You have your view of the world and no amount of research or evidence will change that view. We are talking about CHILD POVERTY - second highest rate of CHILD POVERTY in the economically developed world. These are children who can't escape the situation they are in - they are not the one's "who will not control their personal habits and will not do what is necessary to join the workforce" - they are helpless children.

Have you ever visited a school in an inner-city (or high immigrant school or a school in a Native American community) and seen the amazing work that the teachers are doing. Even in Wakonda 40% of the students test at proficient or above (the average at North Platte is 78% for reading compared to Elkhom where it is 96%.) That is accomplished against great odds by very dedicated teachers; who could care less about the statistics of the district, state or nation. But it is YOUR JOB to understand that research and those statistics and to build policy based upon them instead of policy based upon your prejudices about "lazy and second rate teachers."

There are hundreds of studies where money improved education - free breakfast and lunch have done wonders for children who don't get fed at home due to parent income or neglect - English Language Learner programs - programs that bring parents into the school to observe the teacher and learn how they can help their child learn - The North High School (OPS) engineering program - Skills USA & Destination Imagination programs - along with so many other programs. Open your eyes, the evidence is all around you. But the best solution is not in spending in the schools, but instead in finding ways to improve the child's home life where he/she spends 90% of their life from birth to graduation. That is your job and politicians neglect of that job for over a half century is flat malfeasance.

You don't know me - you have no idea whether I'm a progressive or a conservative. But "you know" and it makes no difference what the facts are. Ignorant people don't need facts they have their prejudice and that saves them from having to think about how to solve problems. You see your job as protecting the tax payer from the waste created by schools (any extra money goes to administrators) and help to the poor (they are just lazy and want a handout.) You have a prejudice for every occasion. Shame on you and God save Nebraska's CHILDREN from such prejudice.
