Definition	
Cool-Season Grasses	Cool-Season grasses are types of grasses that thrive in areas with cold freezing winters and hot summers. These grasses grow best when temperatures are between 65 and 80 degrees
Information	
Fescue	Fescue Grasses are drought tolerant, require less fertilizer and develop deep root systems. Fescue Grasses are shade tolerant. Fescue grasses have a thicker blade
Perennial Rye	Perennial Rye Grass prefers full sun but will tolerate partial shade. Perennial Rye is ideal for high traffic areas. It is used in parks and schools. Perennials Rye Grass has a fine texture.
Kentucky Blue	Kentucky bluegrass is synonymous with ideal lawn. It is very winter hardy but does not tolerate shade well. Kentucky bluegrass requires more fertilizer and manintenance.

Explanation	
Types of Seeding Processes	
Spot Seeding	There are a number of products that combine seed, fertilizer and growing material. It makes patching a yard very easy. There is even products for the dead patches caused by dogs.
Over Seeding	This is the process of seeding over a problem or thin yard. Simply mow your lawn short and rake to loosen some soil. Use a spreader to spread the seed. Keep the lawn moist. Mowing can resume after grass has emerged. Keep activity to a minimum until grass is established.
New Lawn Seeding	The ground should be broke to 3" depth and the clods removed. Smooth and level. Remember this is your finished grade. Add starter fertilizer. Spread the grass seed and rake in. Roll if you have a roller. Water frequently but do not over saturate.
