The Barnes-Hecker Tragedy affected the entire community of Ishpeming and its surrounding neighborhoods. It was the worst single tragedy, but only one of many in which hundreds upon hundreds of iron ore miners were lost in mine accidents on the Marquette Iron Range. You will be moved by this presentation that provides both historic context and personal insight into one family that exemplifies every family that was affected by the untimely death of a family in our area's iron ore mines.

**Remembering the Barnes-Hecker Tragedy

Presenter: Tom Friggens, author of No Tears in Heaven, and retired director of the Michigan Iron Industry Museum

Tom Friggens will recount some of the compelling human stories of November 3, 1926; a day that began as any other day at Barnes-Hecker Mine. . . until the lights went out underground, and a rush of air told the miners something was terribly wrong. Only one man escaped from the torrent of water, mud and debris that flooded through the mine. Fifty-one men were lost and 41 remain entombed at Barnes-Hecker. This program is offered as a collaboration of the Marquette Regional History Center and the Michigan Iron Industry Museum. A \$5 donation is suggested.

**Ecumenical Memorial Service
Bethel Lutheran Church, 333 East Ridge Street, Ishpeming**

For the first time since Memorial Day 1927, a community-wide ecumenical memorial service will convene to commemorate the legacy of Barnes-Hecker. Faith leaders will offer brief meditations and music to remember and honor the lives of the 51 men who were lost, and to emphasize the hope and courage of the 42 surviving widows and 132 minor children. The service will include the reading of names of the 51 men and the chiming of bells.

The building is not heated, and the cold reminds us of family members who stood out in the cold at the Barnes-Hecker Mine waiting for word of the fate of their loved ones.
